NORTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

I am writing to you as the newly elected Chairman of the Parish Council. Six councillors were elected unopposed at the May election and we have been fortunate to have co-opted three additional people to make up the full Council. I have been on the Council for the past three years but before that I was Chairman for six years. It is my intention to produce a Council action plan to cover the next four years. During our first meetings we have produced several ideas which will help to improve the village in the future. One idea, from Steve Sadler, Vice Chairman, is the creation of a fantastic recreational facility for the village. Steve has a small train, which is powered by electricity and can pull carriages. At present, the plan is to run the train, which will be free, through the woodland to the side of the recreation playing field. There are of course several issues we have to finalise but we are confident that this can be achieved this year. I have recently, successfully negotiated with the Fields First Trust, to have permission to proceed with this venture. We will keep you up to date with this plan in future. It is my intention to write a regular slot in the Messenger to keep residents up to date with Council developments. For instance, we are working closer with the Village Hall Management Committee to give them greater support, for what is a major community asset in our village. In addition, I would like to see greater efforts to curb speed in the village and we will be reviewing this topic. This is a good question as many residents do not even know that we do have them. If you drive or walk down Heath Road you will eventually get to the sharp bend which takes you up to Tostock. At the bend there is a bungalow to your right and to the left of the bungalow there is a track which you can drive down. After some 30 metres you will see the allotment space immediately to your right. Recently, the unused space has been ploughed and cleared. Currently, we have a small band of very enthusiastic residents, who have plots where they grow a very wide range of vegetables. I have had a plot for about 10 years and have enjoyed every minute. There is nothing better than fresh locally grown vegetables straight from the ground and into the cooking pot. The allotments are owned by the Norton Charity Trust, which is administered by Jill Rowland. The rent for the plot is very reasonable and the plot size can be catered for your particular needs. There has never been such a good time to come and select an allotment for yourself. NORTON W.I.

If there is one subject which engages the British public most frequently it is THE WEATHER! So at our June meeting our President, Jane Williams, gave us a very comprehensive talk about this very subject. She started by showing us the orientation of the world, how it is tipped at an angle of 23.5 degrees and how the British Isles are placed in relation to this angle. Our weather is largely dominated by the sea and its temperature which surrounds us. Although, for example, we are on the same latitude as Labrador in Canada, because they don't have the sea influence on their weather it is much colder. Jane also talked about the weather forecasters favourite item, the jet stream, and how that also affects us, depending on where it is flowing at any time. Britain also sits on the edge of two main weather regions so that also influences the weather. We talked about thunderstorms, tornadoes, cyclones and hurricanes, thankfully some of these we do not have and the hot topic of the day, climate change. This will in due course affect us all worldwide, and is indeed already doing so in many parts of the world, including Britain. No doubt we shall continue to talk about the weather, I think it is in our blood.

DOWN OUR STREET

This month I am taking a look at the history of the 'Odd Fellows' of Norton.

The earliest Guilds in England can be traced back to the 8th century and followed the establishment of the Christian Church in Britain, which advocated setting up local fraternities for mutual support and protection. These guilds were sworn brotherhoods that had binding oaths to support one another in times of adversity and back one another in trade ventures alongside with their philosophical and ceremonial role. Meetings involved proper decorum and wearing of regalia such as chains of office, special robes and so on. They have elaborate initiation ceremonies in which apprentices who join go through a step-by-step "initiatory rites" intended to teach them the mysteries and secrets of the trade, moral principles, and to ascend them into hierarchy within the association. Apprentices were the trainees, Fellows were the wage earners or 'journeymen' (which comes from the Latin term for 'day' as they were paid by the day), the Masters (experts) were the bosses and owners of businesses. Each guild was headed by a Grand Master whose role included judging the completion of training by the Apprentices, each of whom had to submit a sample of their work, a Masterpiece, to the Grand Master to prove their skill. By the 13th century, Trade Guilds had been established in every city, town and village in the country. Guild meetings were usually held in churches, but more prosperous Guilds began building their own Guild Halls for their meetings and feasts.

In 1545, when Henry VIII broke free from Rome, all the material property of the Guilds was confiscated by the Crown because of their integral connection with the Roman Catholic church. With the loss of their assets, the locally based Guild system was beginning to fail. Some adapted to become 'Freemasons' and others 'The City of London Livery Companies' such as The Merchant Taylors, Goldsmiths and Skinners, etc. However, as early as the 1600's, *fellows* or *journeymen* from various crafts and guilds formed their own fraternities called "journeymen associations", to defend their collective interests against the monopoly of the guild "Masters" and to provide food, lodging, and guidance for one another when they travelled in search for work. As compared with the craft guilds, these associations usually consisted of "fellows" and "apprentices" representing numerous crafts or trades – an "odd" mixture of tradesmen or 'Oddfellows'.

During the closing years of the 18th century, when the French Revolution was in progress, suspicions about the motives of the Oddfellows and other societies reached fever pitch and penal laws were passed that meant membership of a society like the Oddfellows was a criminal offence.

The 'gatherings of ordinary working people' were considered a threat and organisations such as the Oddfellows developed schemes to protect themselves and their members. Passwords were introduced for meetings and members could only be introduced by existing members who knew and trusted them, which usually meant close family and friends only.


An Act of Parliament was passed suppressing 'all societies which administer oaths and correspond by signs and passwords'. To make this effective the Government employed spies and informers to infiltrate lodge meetings to gain evidence for magistrates of illegal activities.


In 1834, farm workers in West Dorset formed a workers' union as they could not bear yet more cuts to their pay. Some fought back by smashing the new threshing-machines, but this brought harsh punishments. Unions were lawful and growing fast, but six leaders of the union were arrested and sentenced to seven years' transportation to Australia *for taking an oath of secrecy*. A massive protest swept across the country. Thousands of people marched through London and many more organised petitions and protest meetings to demand their freedom. They were pardoned in 1836 and returned to England between 1837 and 1839. They became known as the 'Tolpuddle Martyrs'.

The Independent Order of Oddfellows Manchester Unity Friendly Society Limited, also called the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows, came into existence in 1810 and grew to be the largest 'Friendly Society' in the world. On Tuesday, July 25th, 1843, The Norton Lodge, number 3571 formed and was named "Hand of Charity".

The Lodge was based at 'The Dog' in the early days and contemporary newspaper reports show that the 2nd Anniversary Meeting was held on Monday, 28th April 1845. Members of the Oddfellows processed from Dog Corner to St Andrew's Church, 'headed by the Woolpit Band, which much enlivened the scene and caused a vast assembly of spectators from the surrounding parishes, and a great number followed them to church'. Dr Thomas Barsham was the President of The Lodge and Rev Dr Aldersey Dicken gave the address to the members from Ecclesiastes Ch 11 v 9.

You who are young, be happy while you are young, and let your heart give you joy in the days of your youth. Follow the ways of your heart and whatever your eyes see, but know that for all these things God will bring you into judgment.

At three o'clock about 50 brethren and friends sat down to an excellent dinner provided by the host Smith of 'The Dog', in a room appropriately decorated for the occasion. It was stated that the Bury District had 36 Lodges and over 15,000 members and that numbers were increasing rapidly.

However, we need to remember that Oddfellows remained an illegal organisation right up to 1850, at which time some Members of Parliament still expressed concerns about the capabilities of the Oddfellows to ferment trouble because it had organised groups of people in all major towns and cities across the country.

The appeal of the Oddfellows arose because there was no Welfare State or National Health system, meaning that if a man was injured at work, there was no income for his family or help with doctor's fees. If he died, there was no help with funeral costs or aid for his widow and dependants and of course, there was no Old Age Pension! Oddfellows filled this important place in people's lives for a modest subscription and did not acknowledge wealth, rank or social status of its members but was there to benefit the lives of humanity. It encouraged happiness and prosperity through thrift, sobriety and self-respect.

Numbers grew rapidly and by 1893 (the jubilee year) there were 320 members and the Lodge had long since moved across from 'The Dog' to the club room attached to the 'Plumber's Arms'. The anniversary was held on Mr Rolfe's meadow and there were fairground rides powered by steam engines, marquees, (including a large one for the luncheon), sports, shooting galleries and fruit, vegetable and flower shows with prizes. My own great grandfather was an honorary member. One object of particular interest that morning was a large cart drawn by a single horse, in which, amid profuse decoration stood a woman in 'widow's weeds', holding a baby in her arms and surrounded by three girls of varying ages. The representation being intended to personify the objects and usefulness of the Lodge. The event was photographed by William Spanton.

In 1911, the Oddfellows protected so many people in Britain that when the government set up the National Insurance Act, they used the Oddfellows' actuarial tables to work out the level of contribution and payment required.

After the Second World War, many of the Oddfellows' key administrators were sought to run the fledgling Welfare State and National Health Service, because most people viewed friendly societies as being integral to health and welfare provision in the UK. Since 1948 the Society has continued to offer its members this unique mix of social involvement, care and support and financial benefits.

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
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
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
